Meet Chuck Horner



Dan Diguilio



Dan has been coming to Florida since the early 70's when Carol's family retired here visiting two or three times a year. When Carol retired as an operating room technician they decided to move here permanently.






cision we ever made. After becoming aware of the number of children living in poverty in Vero Beach, Kiwanis seemed like a good way to help them get a better life

Stuart and his wife Diane have been married 49 years. They have two daughters, Alison and Amy.




Stuart is Executive Director of The Youth Sailing Foundation in Vero Beach.


George has attended Tufts University, Villanova University, The University of Miami and Penn (Wharton). George served in the United State Army and is a Vietnam Veteran.


